



Research


Over the past few months, New Harvest Fellow Santiago Campuzano
has been perfecting his fluorescent staining and scanning electron
microscopy technique. Here are a few of his early images, of murine
C2C12 (mouse) cells on a celery scaffold:




Santiago's fluorescent staining here shows red cell nuclei, green cytoskeleton, and blue cellulose.



Another look at Santiago's C2C12 mouse myoblast cells on celery scaffold.




This is the same image as above, but with the C2C12 mouse myoblast cells colored blue.



Santiago's C2C12 mouse myoblast cells on celery at higher resolution.


New Harvest Fellow Natalie Rubio is preparing to determine the caloric
content of some of her cell populations - to do so, she is using bomb
calorimetry, a method in which material is combusted and the heat that is
released is carefully measured.

Bomb Calorimeter

- Did you know? The first calorimeter was used by <u>Antoine</u>
 <u>Lavoisier</u> and <u>Pierre-Simon Laplace</u>, in the winter of 1782 to measure the heat given off by various chemical changes. You can read more about the calorimeter here.
